



[Dr. Strangelove or: How I Stopped Worrying and Learned to Love the Bomb (1964)


November 30, 2012]



One day an insurance salesman discovers his entire life is a hoax, he's actually the star of a carefully scripted reality TV show—the most popular one in the world—that has aired since his birth. It received Academy Award nominations for Best Supporting Actor, Director and Screenplay. It was directed by Peter Wier and stars Jim Carry, Ed Harris and Laura Linneu.







Strange Women: Sci-Fi Classics

March 22, 2013]

This double feature presents two classic B-film space operas. In *Queen*, Astronauts are drawn by mysterious forces to the planet Venus which they find to be inhabited only by beautiful women. It was directed by Edward Bernds and stars Zsa Zsa Gabor. In *Attack*, a neglected wife grows to gigantic proportions after an encounter with aliens and the titanic beauty is set on revenge. It was directed by Nathan Juran and stars Allison Hayes, William Hudson and Yvette Vickers.

One Million Years B.C. (1964)

March 29, 2013]

In the far distant past, a member of the Rock Tribe is expelled from their cave and takes up with a woman from another tribe. The film traces their journey as they set out to face a harsh prehistoric world filled with dinosaurs and volcanoes. It was directed by Don Chaffey, with special effects by Ray Harryhausen, and stars Raquel Welch and John Richardson.

Barbarella (1968) April 5, 2013

Based on a classic French comic strip, Barbarella—in the far distant forty-first century—sets off for the city of Sogo on the planet Lythion where a new sin is invented every hour. Along the way, she encounters a variety of strange characters and situations. The film was directed by Roger Vadim and stars Jane Fonda, John Philip Law and Anita Pallenberg.


